## 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

Mark's gospel today is one of the rare occasions where the evangelists record a phrase in the mother tongue of Jesus: Aramaic. This was a very direct lan-

guage, with few shades of grey, a black and white tongue which left your hearers in no doubt about what you had said. Jesus' actions also convey this directness, the spitting and touching of tongue and ears. They complement that one phrase of three syllables that came straight from Jesus's heart and from his prayer:

Eph-pha-tha – "Be Opened".

A deaf man with a speech impediment can now hear and speak clearly. So it is with conversion of heart, of believers and unbelievers both; our need invites the mercy of Christ's miracle. *Eph-pha-tha* – hear and speak!

### **Social Justice Week: 8-14 September 2024**

Imagine Peace for all: Choose forgiveness, know peace.

Each year, the New Zealand Catholic Bishops lead us in Social Justice Week to consider an issue of social justice in Aotearoa. Last year we began a three-year Social Justice Week focus on peace and conflict. The Social Justice Week tagline for 2024 is 'Choose forgiveness, know peace.' The focus this year is on forgiveness and reconciliation. We shift the perspective from personal peace, which we explored last year, and instead look at how to relate to others from a Christian view and rebuild peace that may have been lost or broken. Forgiveness is something that we all experience, whether we are giving it or receiving it. When we decide to choose forgiveness, we are on the right track to peace. #### Catechetical Corner

#### WHAT WE DO IN OUR CHURCH SERVICE IS CONTAGIOUS

I have been to the sky stadium in Wellington several times to watch a soccer game during the FIFA women's world cup tournament or to a cricket match. On all those occasions, someone or a group of people, from some part of the stadium started either to sing or shout a slogan in support of the playing teams that electrified the entire stadium, and the spectators sat and stood up forming waves across the stadium. A particular action that someone or a group started became so contagious! Well, it reminded me how important it is for us to know what we do at Mass and other Church services is contagious.

The Church service, whether during Mass or other gatherings, is a communal experience where each action holds profound significance. We can impact those around us in a positive or negative way. What we do during these moments is not only a personal expression of faith but also something that deeply influences those around us. When we sing with enthusiasm, pray devoutly, listen intently, show warmth and hospitality, place money offering in the collection box, devoutly serving at the altar, proclaiming the Word of God with positive vibes, chanting the psalm with reverence, receive the Body and Blood of Christ with faith, love, devotion and reverence etc. carry a contagious energy that can uplift, inspire, and unite the community in worship. When we do them, we impact in a very positive way the worship atmosphere for those around us. St. Augustine in his famous book, "Confessions of St. Augustin" wrote, "How I wept deeply moved by your hymn, songs, and the voices that echoed through your Church! What emotion I experienced in them! Those sounds flowed into my ears, distilling the truth in my heart. A feeling of devotion, surged within me, and tears streamed down my face – tears that did me good." (CCC, 1157).



When we pray aloud, our words echo beyond our own hearts. They become a shared expression of hope, gratitude, and supplication, inviting others to join in and deepen their own connection with God. This collective prayer creates a powerful atmosphere where the presence of the divine feels more palpable, drawing everyone closer in spirit.

• Singing during the service has an equally contagious effect. Music is a universal language that transcends words, and when we sing together, it unites us in a profound way. Our voices, joined in melody and harmony, create a sense of unity and shared purpose. Even those who might be hesitant to sing often find themselves carried along by the collective energy of the congregation, lifting their voices in praise.
