Conferences cancelled; Regional days cancelled; lock-downs in our homes and towns; lack of the right products when shopping; delays in getting our driving licences renewed; and the list goes on and on. Our son was accepted for an AFS scholarship to the United States at the age of 16 and his counsellor in preparation gave him this motto to live with for the year "Always travel without expectations". It stood him in good stead, and we have tried to follow that mantra while travelling life's highways.

As I write this, we in Hamilton are in a waiting time to host President, Susan, for her visit which replaces her coming to Diocesan Conference and also the country is waiting for the results of the referenda.

It is difficult to know what that outcome will be but I think that if the votes are 'Yes' for both the End of Life Choice and legalising recreational cannabis use, New Zealand will make a massive social change as a society. 

#### **WUCWO Report**

Hopefully your WUCWO rep passes on the panui (newsletters) that I send each month along with the full text of WUCWO
President General's newsletter from Rome.
Communication that is extending into digital technologies, active engagement and mutual listening, and the inclusivity of women in the Pope's encyclicals have been the focus of my last 3 panui.

A reminder that WUCWO is now 110 years old. It would be awesome if each branch made a pictorial display of the great works CWL members engage in and organise these to be shown in Church foyers after mass or in Parish halls during other parish gatherings in February or March next year. We should be proud of all our activities and this is one way to invite other women in the parish to join us in Faith and Service.

The March edition of Women's Voice arrived last week. It will be followed quite quickly by the next edition both having been held up at the printers during Covid19. There are a series of articles based around the theme Holiness and calls to action. One of the articles By Maureen Meatcher from the National Board of Catholic Women, England and Wales, reminds us that Pope Francis states "we are impelled to contribute to the public discussion of social issues, not only as involved citizens, but also because of the Christian understanding of what a just and sustainable society looks like" (p.20). I am confident the two recent referendums have seen us reading and engaging with others in debate about the social issues of Cannabis and End of Life Choice. No doubt by the time you are reading this we will know how the majority of New Zealanders have voted. The article referred to highlights the following

It is our responsibility as citizens of the world to monitor what our country is doing to enable every person to enjoy their human rights (p 22)

A sharp reminder that we are not just an organisation that bakes cakes and sews for our mission station and *At Home Appeal*, or a group that socially supports Catholic women, but we also have a responsibility to speak out and act in social justice and human rights issues.

October is the month of the Holy Rosary. The Rosary is often termed the greatest prayer of the Catholic Church. It is a contemplative prayer usually recited to implore a favour from God for the recovery of a loved one from illness, a special intention, a thank you to God, a prayer for peace or just a prayer that every Catholic knows. How fitting that we meditate on the mysteries of joy, sorrow, glory and light as we pray. This month I have recited the rosary almost daily as I sat by the bedside of a friend who was dying and placed her own rosary beads in her frail hands.



This month, I have attended two vigil rosaries. The first for our CWL diocesan chaplain, Fr John Morrison and the second for CWL honorary life member and friend, Pat Duncan, prior to their requiem masses.

How lucky we are as Catholics, to have this wonderful (and tactile prayer thanks to our rosary beads) at times of need. Fr John was chaplain to the Christchurch diocesan league for over 20 years. He was a wonderful chaplain, committed to faith and service and he loved the League and what we stand for. His monthly reflections at our council meetings were

always stimulating and inspiring. Following Father's requiem, it was so lovely to see our guard of honour in recognition and thanks for his contribution to our diocese. Members from all branches wearing their badges and holding their banners in front of them, formed a guard of honour, from the doors of the pro cathedral to the hearse, as Father John was carried out. Last week, a requiem was celebrated at St Itas here in Rakaia, for Pat Duncan QSM. It was a



great comfort to see so many of our members in attendance especially when I called them to come up to the altar to surround Pat's casket as we read, especially for her, the league prayer for the deceased. Pat was an honorary life member of the Rakaia branch of the League. Pat was also the recipient of the papal medal, Pro Ecclesia et Pontifice. She had held all executive positions of the League and was also the Loan League Convenor
