The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Year C

"Take, eat; this is my body." "Take, drink; this is my blood of the covenant."



This weekend we are celebrating the solemnity of The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi). The Catechism of the Catholic Church lists several names for the Eucharist: The Lord's Supper, the Breaking of the Bread, a holy sacrifice, the Blessed Sacrament, Holy Communion, and Holy Mass.

The Eucharist is the celebration of the abiding presence of a loving God as Emmanuel – God with us. Jesus instituted the Eucharist, which is the source and summit of the Christian life. On this feast day we give collective thanks to our Lord for his real presence with us in the Eucharist. In today's second reading St. Paul elaborates how Jesus

converted the ancient ritual into a Sacrament and Sacrifice. Instead of the lamb's blood, Jesus offered his own Body and Blood when he at the last supper said: "Take it... eat ... this is my Body which will be given up for you", and "Take and drink ... This is ... my Blood, the Blood of the new and eternal Covenant, which will be poured out for you and for many...." And in the gospel, we have the passage which anticipates the Eucharist in Jesus' spectacular miracle of the multiplied loaves. Pope St. John Paul II asks: "what more could Jesus have done for us? Truly, in the Eucharist, he shows us a love which goes to the end, a love which knows no measure."

On this feast, we have nine of our children who will walk down the aisle to receive Jesus in the Holy Communion for the first time. We congratulate them and their families and convey our gratitude to those who prepared them for this great day in their lives. The day of the First Holy Communion is an unforgettable feast day in our life of faith. The experience and the celebrations of that day always remain with us as memorable events that have significant implications for the rest of our lives and help us to lead a saintly life. In the reception of the Holy Communion, a child of God clothed with the wedding garment, is admitted "to the marriage supper of the lamb" (Rev. 19:9) and receives the food of the new life, the body and blood of Christ.

Let us pray for our first communicants in a special way that the reception of Jesus in the Holy Communion becomes an everlasting experience of God's love and presence for them. Let each of us appreciate and accept this great gift of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist, by receiving him with true repentance for our sins, due preparation, reverence, and love.

Fr. Tikoua has been hospitalized since Thursday last and underwent a surgical procedure on Tuesday and is convalescing. We wish him a speedy recovery and continue to uphold him in our prayers. I will be leaving for India on Wednesday (June 25) for my annual holidays and would value greatly your prayers for me.



Catechetical Corner

What is the Mass?

The Mass is the summit of our spiritual life. It unites us as a community of believers who gather to remember the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. We begin the Mass by signing ourselves with the sign of the Cross and then we acknowledge our failures and ask for God's mercy. Then we join together in offering praise to God.

In the readings and the homily, the Lord reveals himself to us. We see how God has interacted with human beings throughout history. We see how the Holy Spirit inspires and guides us in our own lives.

In gratitude for all that our gracious and loving God has done for us; we offer ourselves to God. We offer our strengths and weaknesses, our joys, our sorrows. We unite our offering with one sacrifice that Jesus made when he died on the Cross.

We watch in wonder as bread and wine are transformed into the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus. It is through this sacrifice that Jesus bestows upon us the grace of salvation. We pray together in the words that Jesus taught us, the Our Father. Then, we share a spiritual meal in communion with one another. We experience the Real Presence of Jesus. We give thanks for all the good things that the Lord has done for us.

At the end of the Mass, we are sent into the world to love and serve the Lord and one another.

Preparing for Mass

For some people in the parish, taking time to prepare for Mass is essential. The priest prepares a homily, lectors spend time reviewing the readings, the choir select the hymns that relate to the readings and practice. The Mass managers prepare the altar and church for the Mass, liturgy committee plan for the liturgy, someone does the flower arrangements and decorations, staff members make sure bulletin is ready for distribution, someone cleans the church, someone else offers hospitality etc. leading to the celebration the Mass.

But it is important to realize that everyone taking part in the Mass needs to prepare for it. The preparations that we make help us enter more deeply into the celebration of the Mass and achieve a more intimate union with Christ and the other members of the worshipping community. Here are a few simple things that might help us to prepare for Mass:

Know why we are in the church.

Reflect on the readings in advance.

Think about our offerings at the Mass.

See ourselves as part of the community.

Spend some time in silence before the Mass begins.

Think about what we are saying as we recite the prayers of the Mass.

Be enthusiastic as we speak the words of the responses.

Sing with our heart and soul.

Pay close attention to the homily.

Allow ourselves to feel a sense of awe during the consecration.

Realize ourselves that we are receiving the Real Presence of Jesus during communion.

Spend a few moments after communion and before we leave the church in silent meditation and prayer, thinking about what we experienced.
